Workshop concept

<u>Title</u>: Inclusive disaster risk reduction – practical guidance for inclusive programming

Timeframe: One day workshop, 10th October 2017, 9.30am - 4.30pm

<u>Objective</u>: Building up the participants understanding for the relevance and principles of the inclusion people who are disproportionately affected by disasters in disaster risk reduction (DRR) and strengthening their competences in applying inclusion principles in DRR programming.

<u>Lead</u>: The workshop is led by CBM Switzerland, with support and contributions of the Center for Disability in Development (CDD). Practical project examples with different inclusion perspectives are presented by CBM/CDD, Caritas and Save the Children.

<u>Target Audience</u>: DRR focal persons, Programme Managers and Desk officers of Swiss-based NGOs and Swiss Government; interested audience.

<u>Guiding questions</u>: 1) What are the international frameworks for inclusion in disaster risk reduction and how have they developed in recent years? 2) What are the key factors that put some people and groups at a disproportionate risk from disaster? 3) What are the basic principles of inclusive programming? 4) Which particular aspects need to be considered when integrating a gender, age, disability or cultural inclusion perspective in DRR programming? 5) What actions are needed for inclusion to become a lived reality in our work?

<u>Preparation</u>: Participants should have a general understanding of DRR before the course. Participants unfamiliar with DRR read the DRR briefing Note by the Swiss NGO DRR Platform (available at: http://www.drrplatform.org/publications).

Train connection from Bern: IC 707 at 7:32, arriving in Thalwil at 8:43

Train connection from Luzern: IR 2628 at 8:10, arriving in Thalwil at 8:45

There are two pedestrian overpasses at Thalwil train station. Take the one at the front end of the train arriving from Zürich and walk towards Thalwil City Center. Cross the main road to the bus station and take bus number 142 to Thalwil Böni. At Thalwil Böni, walk right towards Bönirainstrasse. Follow Bönirainstrasse for about 100m - Coop Bau & Hobby is on your right - then turn right, following Schützenstrasse for about 300m to the GUK Building (see picture). Take the staircase at the side of the building to the main entrance. The CBM Office is on the first floor.
