

Invitation to a webinar: How to better integrate the Leave No One Behind Agenda & Disaster Risk Reduction

26th May 2021, 11h00 - 12h15 (CET)

One of the foundations of the SDGs is to leave no one behind, especially in a context of growing inequality between countries and within countries. In various contexts, people are being further left behind because of globalisation, technological developments, discrimination based on age, gender, disability, sexual orientation, ethnicity, or religion.

Often, policies, legislation and investments fail to take into consideration those left behind. People who suffer poverty are all left behind. In addition, the UNDP lists 5 key factors that result in being left behind: geography, discrimination, shocks and fragility, governance, socio-economic status. People at the intersection of these face compounded disadvantage.

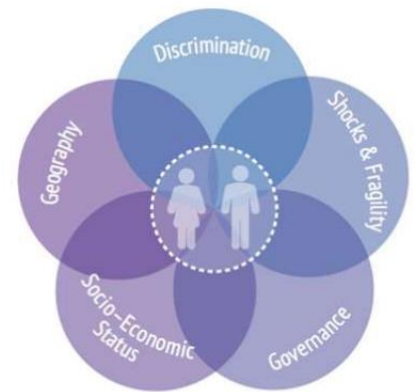


Figure 1 UNDP 5 Key Factors for being left behind.

The 'Leave No One Behind' (LNOB) Agenda is also a central part of the Sendai Framework for Disaster Risk Reduction (SFDRR). For Priority 1 (*Understanding disaster risk*), understanding disaster risk for those at the intersection of multiple disadvantages. For Priority 2 (*Strengthening disaster risk governance to manage disaster risk*), it is essential to include mechanisms where voices of the most disenfranchised are being conveyed to policy makers on the local, national and international level. For Priority 3 (*Investing in disaster risk reduction for resilience*), financing and budgeting are crucial to ensure people are not further marginalised. This webinar will explore the linkages between Disaster Risk Reduction and Climate Change Adaptation and the LNOB Agenda
